Bylaw Number 630/04

A BYLAW OF THE TOWN OF ELK POINT, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO LICENSE AND CONTROL DOGS, CATS AND OTHER ANIMALS WITHIN THE TOWN OF TOWN OF ELK POINT

WHEREAS, the Council deems it necessary to regulate dogs and cats, to provide for the licensing of dogs and cats, to provide for the confinements of certain animals within the Town, to provide off-leash dog areas and to regulate and control other animals;

AND WHEREAS, Section 7 of the *Municipal Government Act*, R.S.A. 2000, for the Province of Alberta, gives the Council the authority to pass such a bylaw;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Town of Elk Point in the Province of Alberta duly assembled, hereby enacts as follows:

PART I – TITLE AND DEFINITIONS

1. This Bylaw may be cited as the “Animal Control Bylaw”
2. In this Bylaw, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - (a) **“Animal”** means, any living organism, other than a human, having sensation and the power of voluntary movement and requiring oxygen and organic food for existence.
 - (b) **“At Large”** means, if the dog or cat is off the premises of the owner or harbourer and not on a leash held by a person able to control the dog or cat.
 - (c) **“Brand”** means, a Brand as defined in the *Brand Act of Alberta Regulations*.
 - (d) **“Cat”** means, any male or female member of the feline family.
 - (e) **“Cattery”** means, any person, group of persons, firm or corporation that is an approved and currently licensed establishment, which is engaged in the business or recreation of breeding and/or boarding and/or selling of cats.
 - (f) **“Communicable Disease”** means a disease that affects animals and may be transmitted to human beings.
 - (g) **“Collar”** means, a band of metal or material, which is of suitable size and strength that may be humanely placed around the neck of an animal.
 - (h) **“Council”** means, the Council of the Town of Elk Point.
 - (i) **“Dangerous Dog”** means, any dog at any age or sex which:
 - (i) shows a propensity, disposition or potential to attack or injure, without provocation, humans or other animals; or
 - (ii) without provocation, chases humans or other animals; or
 - (iii) is a continuing threat of serious harm to humans or other animals; or
 - (iv) without provocation, has attacked humans or other animals;and/or that a peace officer determines on reasonable grounds to be a dangerous dog, either through personal observation or on the basis of facts determined after an investigation initiated by a complaint.
 - (j) **“Dog”** means, either a male or female member of the canine family.

- (k) **“Feral”** means, an animal, which, in the opinion of a registered veterinarian, is wild in nature and shows no signs of domestication.
- (l) **“Harness”** means, straps and fittings that are of suitable size and strength that may be humanely attached to the chest and back of an animal.
- (m) **“Identification”** means, a functioning and/or clearly readable:
 - 1) microchip; or
 - a) license tag; or
 - (iii) vaccination tag; or
 - (iv) tattoo; or
 - (v) personal tag; or
 - (vi) brand;which is found on an animal and can be traced to current ownership information.
- (n) **“Kennel”** means, any person, group of persons, firm or corporation that is an approved and currently licensed establishment, which is engaged in the business or recreation of breeding and/or boarding and/or selling of dogs.
- (o) **“Livestock”** means, such animal that has been domesticated for agricultural use or pets including but not limited to; horse, head of cattle, chicken, sheep, swine, goat, mule or ass, but does not include dogs or cats.
- (p) **“Leash”** means, a tether no longer than three (3) meters and of suitable strength that may be humanely attached to the collar or harness of an animal.
- (q) **“Microchip”** means, an encoded electronic device implanted in an animal by or under the supervision of a registered veterinarian, which contains a unique code number that provides owner information and is stored in a central database.
- (r) **“Muzzle”** means, a humane fastening or covering device of adequate strength placed over the mouth of an animal to prevent it from biting.
- (s) **“Owner”** means, any person, partnership, association or corporation owning, possessing or having charge of or care and control over any animal; or harbouring any animal; or suffering or permitting any animal to remain about the Owner’s house or premises.
- (t) **“Parkland”** means, all recreational land areas owned or controlled by the Town, lying within the Town limits, and whether improved in whole or in part, or in its natural state, and includes areas administered by the Town’s Parks and Facilities Department and includes buildings or other improvements situated on these land areas.
- (u) **“Peace Officer”** means, a Bylaw Officer, Animal Control Officer or Special Constable for the Town or a police officer as defined under the Police Act.
- (v) **“Residential District”** means, designated residential district as per Elk Point Land Use Bylaw.
- (w) **“Tattoo”** means, a permanent marking on the skin of an animal created by or under the supervision of a registered veterinarian, which contains a unique code of letters and numbers that provide owner information recorded by a registered veterinarian and/or the Alberta Veterinarian’s Medical Association and its national affiliates.
- (x) **“Town”** means, the Town of Elk Point.

- (y) **“Town Animal Shelter”** means, the premises designated by the Town for the purpose of impounding and caring for dogs, cats and other animals regulated under this bylaw.
- (z) **“Registered Veterinarian”** means, a registered veterinarian as defined in the *Veterinary Profession Act*.
- (aa) **“Violation Ticket”** shall mean a document in a format as prescribed from time to time by the Provincial Offences Procedure Act.
- (bb) **“Violation Tag”** means, a Municipal violation notice or tag, allowing for a voluntary payment of a specified penalty to be paid out of court to the Town in lieu of appearing in answer to a summons.

PART II – LICENSING

3. No person shall own, keep or harbour any dog or cat within the Town limits unless such dog or cat is licensed.
4. The owner of every dog or cat over the age of six (6) months in the Town shall, between the first (1st) and thirty-first (31st) day of January in each calendar year, pay a license fee as set out in the current Fees and Charges Schedules, as determined from time to time by the Council. Senior citizens over 65 years of age, as well as owners of certified seeing-eye dogs, police dogs and assisted living dogs shall be exempt from all animal license fees only. This shall be the only exemption for owners of such pets under this bylaw.
5. Every person who becomes the owner of a dog or cat over the age of six (6) months or takes up residence within the Town and who is the owner of the dog or cat which is over the age of six (6) months and which is not currently licensed in accordance with this bylaw, shall license the same and pay the license fee, within one (1) month after becoming owner of the said dog or cat; or taking up residence within the Town.
6. In the prosecution or proceedings for a contravention of this bylaw, the burden of proof relating to the age of the dog shall be upon the owner and unless the contrary is proven, the dog shall be presumed to have attained the minimum age of six (6) months at the time of the charge.
7. Licenses issued under this bylaw shall not be transferable from one dog or cat to another or from one owner to another.
8. (a) Upon payment of the required license fee, the owner of a pet license will be supplied with either:
 - i) a pet license tag if the animal in question has not been licensed the previous year; or
 - ii) a pet license renewal receipt if the animal in question already has a license tag and has been licensed the previous year.
- (b) If said license tag is lost, a replacement tag can be purchased by the owner upon making payment of the fee set out in the current Fees and Charges Schedule.
- (c) If said license tag is not associated with current ownership and/or animal information, the license tag shall be deemed invalid.
- (d) No person shall be entitled to a license rebate under this Bylaw.
9. Every owner shall provide a suitable collar or harness and ensure that the license tag is securely fastened to a collar or harness which must be worn by the dog or cat at all times when it is off the premises of the owner.

10. Dog and cat owners shall provide the Town with the following information with each application for a dog or cat license:
 - (a) name and street address and phone number of owner; and
 - (b) name and description of dog or cat to be licensed; and
 - (c) such other information as required with respect to the application.
11. The Town Administration Office shall keep a record of all dog and cat licenses pursuant to Section 10 of this Bylaw.
12. Every owner shall notify the Town of his or her change of address within fifteen (15) days of the change of residency.
13. Notwithstanding Section 14 of this Bylaw, no person shall keep or harbour
 - (a) more than three (3) dogs; or
 - (b) more than three (3) cats; or
 - (c) more than a total of four (4) cats and dogs combined,of whatever sex, whether licensed or not and aged six (6) months or more, at one and the same time, in any house, shelter, room or place within the Town.
14. Within limits of the Town, Section 3 and Section 13 of this Bylaw shall not apply to:
 - (a) any premises lawfully used for the care and treatment of dogs or cats operated by and in charge of a registered veterinarian; or
 - (b) any premises that may be temporarily used for the purpose of a dog or cat show; or
 - (c) an organization that is offering a recognized training or obedience class for dogs or cats; or
 - (d) any person in possession of a valid business license to operate a “Pet Store”, “Animal Grooming Parlor”, “Dog Kennel” or “Cattery”, as long as said person adheres to said business license conditions; or
 - (e) dogs or cats accompanying persons temporarily in the Town on business or vacation for a period not exceeding fourteen (14) days, or such longer periods as may be authorized by written permission from the Town.
15.
 - (a) No person shall operate a dog kennel or cattery in any residential district in the Town.
 - (b) Anyone operating a licensed dog kennel in a residential district before 2001 shall be exempt from subsection (a) provided that all present and future conditions placed on the operation of that kennel are adhered to, but in no event shall the business or operation expand in size or scope.

PART III – DANGEROUS DOGS

16.
 - (a) The owner of a Dangerous Dog shall take all necessary steps to ensure that it does not bite, chase or attack any human or other animal, whether the animal is on the property of the owner or not.
 - (b) If a Dangerous Dog bites, chases or attacks a person or animal, the Owner shall be guilty of an offence and be liable to a fine under this bylaw, exclusive of any other civil actions or penalties.

17. (a) When a Dangerous Dog is on the premises of its owner, it shall be kept confined indoors under the effective control of a person over the age of sixteen (16) years, or confined in a securely enclosed and locked pen, or other structure constructed and secured in such a fashion as to prevent the escape of the Dangerous Dog, and to prevent the entry of persons unauthorized by the owner.
 - (b) Any such pen shall have a secure top and sides and either:
 - (i) have a secure bottom effectively attached to the sides; or
 - (ii) the sides shall be embedded in the ground to a minimum of thirty centimeters (30 cm).
 - (c) When a Dangerous Dog is off the premises of the owner, it shall be securely muzzled, and shall be either harnessed or leashed securely to effectively prevent it from attacking or biting a human or other animal; provided that this requirement shall not apply when the Dangerous Dog is in a building or enclosure in attendance at a bona fide dog show, or confined in a pen meeting the requirements of subsections (a) and (b).
18. (a) The owner of a dog, which the owner knows or ought to know is a Dangerous Dog, shall keep the Dangerous Dog in accordance with the provisions of Section 17.
 - (b) If a Peace Officer determines on reasonable grounds that a dog is a Dangerous Dog, either through personal observation or on the basis of facts determined after an investigation initiated by a complaint, he may:
 - (i) give the owner a written notice that the dog has been determined to be a Dangerous Dog; and
 - (ii) require the owner to keep such dog in accordance with the provisions of Section 17 of this Bylaw upon the owner's receipt of the notice; and
 - (iii) inform the owner that if the Dangerous Dog is not kept in accordance with Section 17 of this Bylaw, the owner will be fined, or subject to enforcement action under this bylaw.
 - (c) Where the owner of a dog that has been determined to be a Dangerous Dog produces information to the Town Bylaw Department that may alter a determination made under subsection (b), the Supervisor of the Department shall, as soon as is reasonably possible, cause the matter to be reviewed and make a final determination.
19. Provisions in this Bylaw that apply to Dangerous Dogs shall not apply to dogs owned by a Police service solely by reason of any events or actions which occur while the dogs are engaged in police work.

PART IV – RESPONSIBILITIES OF OWNERS

20. No owner shall suffer, permit, or allow for any reason his or her dog, cat, livestock or other domesticated animal to be at large within the Town of Elk Point.
21. A female dog or cat in heat shall be confined and housed in the residence of the owner, or taken to a licensed kennel during the whole period that the dog or cat is in heat; except that a female dog or cat on a leash may be allowed outside the said residence for the sole purpose of permitting the dog to defecate and/or urinate on the premises of the owner.

22. (a) If an animal defecates on any public or private property, other than the property of its owner, the owner shall cause such feces to be removed immediately.
- (b) Residences or grounds where any dogs or cats are kept shall at all times be maintained in a clean, sanitary and inoffensive condition, to the satisfaction of a Peace Officer.
- (c) A blind owner of a registered guide dog, or a blind person being assisted by a registered guide dog is not subject to the obligations imposed in subsection (a).
23. No owner shall suffer, permit, allow or for any reason have his or her dog to bark or howl excessively or in any other manner disturb the quiet of any person.
24. No owner shall suffer, permit, allow or for any reason have his or her cat to howl excessively or in any other manner disturb the quiet of any person.
25. No owner shall permit his or her dog, cat, or livestock to damage public or private property.
26. No owner shall suffer, permit, allow or for any reason have his or her dog, cat, or livestock without provocation, cause injury by chasing, biting or attacking a person or other animal.
27. (a) No owner shall permit his or her livestock or other animal, other than a dog or cat, to be on parkland areas.
- (b) Subsection (a) does not apply:
 - (i) when the livestock or animal other than a dog or cat is in a bona fide show at a place and time approved by the Town Parks and Facilities Department.

PART V – OTHER CONTRAVENTIONS

28. Unless otherwise permitted by a Peace Officer, no person shall harbour:
 - (a) any livestock; or
 - (b) any poisonous snakes, poisonous reptiles, or poisonous insects; or
 - (c) any animal or species, including the above, deemed dangerous or objectionable, in the opinion of the Manager of Community Services or a Peace Officer, excluding Dangerous Dogs pursuant to Section 18 of this Bylaw,of whatever sex, at one and the same time, in any house, shelter, room or place within the Town.
29. A Peace Officer is hereby authorized to issue a permit to a person under Section 28 and can also impose conditions on that permit, and if such person fails to meet the conditions of the permit, they are deemed to have not complied with this section.
30. No person shall negligently or willfully open any gate, door or other opening in a fence, enclosure or otherwise release a dog, cat, livestock, or other animal which has been confined, thereby allowing said dog, cat, livestock or animal to run loose in Town.
31. No person shall tease, torment, annoy or harm any dog, cat or domestic animal.
32. No person shall leave an animal unattended in or on a vehicle, without proper protection from the atmospheric elements such as the sun, snow, rain, wind, cold or hot temperatures.

33. Every owner of an animal shall provide sufficient food, water, care and medical attention when required, and shelter including protection from the atmospheric elements such as the sun, snow, rain, wind, cold or hot temperatures.
34. No person shall in any manner hinder or obstruct a Peace Officer in the performance of his duties under this Bylaw.
35. The owner of an animal that is inside or on a vehicle while moving or parked must ensure that:
 - (a) the animal is secured so that it is unable to fall out or leave the vehicle.
 - (b) the animal is secured so that it is unable to reach any of the sides or rear of the vehicle, and therefore prevent the animal from disturbing people or animals when walking by.

PART VI – IMPOUNDMENT AND DISPOSITION

36. A Peace Officer may seize and capture any dog or cat found running at large or other animal including livestock found running loose and impound said animal(s) in the Town Animal Shelter.
37. A Peace Officer may enter any private or public land, vehicle or place, other than a dwelling house without warrant, if necessary, for the purposes of carrying out his duties under this Bylaw.
38. To assist in the seizure or capture of a dog, cat, livestock or other animals running at large or loose, a Peace Officer may utilize live traps, catch poles, snappy snares and/or any other equipment as recommended by the Alberta Veterinarian's Medical Association. Said equipment shall be used in a humane manner.
39.
 - (a) A dog, cat, livestock or other animal impounded under Section 36 shall be kept in the Town Animal Shelter for a period of at least forty-eight (48) hours. Each day that the Town Animal Shelter is closed and the day of impoundment shall not be included in the computation of the forty-eight (48) hour period. During this period, any healthy animal may be redeemed by its owner, or agent of the owner, upon payment of:
 - (i) the appropriate license fee, when a dog or cat is not currently licensed; and,
 - (ii) the boarding fee; and,
 - (iii) any associated medical costs that may have been required; and
 - (iv) the transportation fee if applicable;all in accordance with the Fees & Charges Schedule approved by the Council from time to time.
 - (b) A Peace Officer who takes custody of an animal pursuant to Section 36 shall take all reasonable steps to:
 - (i) ensure the animal is provided with adequate food, water, care, shelter and veterinarian treatment if necessary, and
 - (ii) report any apparent illness, communicable disease, injury, unhealthy condition of any animal in custody to a registered veterinarian, and act upon a registered veterinarian's recommendation.
 - (iii) locate the owner of the animal, including a search of the animal's functioning and clearly readable microchip, license tag, vaccination tag, tattoo, personal identification tag, or brand. The peace officer shall notify the owner of the actions taken in respect to the animal.

- (c) At the expiration of the forty-eight (48) hour period, any animal not claimed shall become the property of the Town and may be humanely euthanized or adopted to a person other than the owner, as directed by a Peace Officer.
 - (d) Written permission from a Peace Officer shall be required for either the adoption or euthanasia of any unclaimed animal following the prescribed forty-eight (48) hour period.
 - (e) A Peace Officer shall be responsible for the destruction of any impounded animal. This responsibility may be delegated at the discretion of the Peace Officer. Any destruction of an animal pursuant to this Bylaw shall be done in a humane a manner and completed by or under the supervision of a registered veterinarian.
 - (f) Any person who adopts said dog, cat or other animal shall obtain full rights and title of said dog, cat or animal and the right and the title of the former owner shall cease forthwith.
40. If in the judgment of a registered veterinarian, an animal that has been caught or impounded by a Peace Officer:
- (a) should be humanely euthanized for humane reasons; or
 - (b) is feral and without any form of identification as defined in this Bylaw, said animal shall be humanely euthanized by a registered veterinarian.
41. No action, civil or otherwise, lies against any Peace Officer, registered veterinarian, Town or any person acting in good faith and under authority afforded under this Bylaw.

PART VII – DISEASE CONTROL

42. In the event of an outbreak, or threatened outbreak of a communicable disease affecting animals, which may be transmitted to human beings or animals, Council may by resolution, order and direct that all animals be confined entirely to the owner's premises.
43. When an animal under quarantine has been diagnosed as rabid or suspected by a registered veterinarian as being affected by a communicable disease and dies while under observation, a Peace Officer shall immediately send the complete body of such animal to the appropriate health department for pathological examination and shall notify the Medical Officer of Health for the Town of reports of human contact, and the diagnosis made of suspected animal.
44. During such period of a communicable disease quarantine as herein mentioned, every animal bitten by an animal adjudged to be affected by said disease, shall forthwith be humanely euthanized, or at the owner's expense and option shall be treated for the disease infection by a registered veterinarian or held under quarantine by the owner in the same manner as other animals are in quarantine.
45. Except as herein provided, no person shall kill, or cause to be killed, any animal suspected of being exposed to a communicable disease or any animal which has bitten a human, nor remove the same from the Town limits without written permission from a Peace Officer.
46. The carcass of any dead animal exposed to a communicable disease shall upon demand, be surrendered to a Peace Officer.
47. A Peace Officer shall direct the disposition of any animal found to be infected with a communicable disease.

PART VIII – DOG CONTROL

48. A Peace Officer may at any time without warning:
- (a) direct that any dog be kept on a suitable leash; and/or
 - (b) deny or suspend privileges of allowing a dog to be at large, to any owner or person in care or control of any dog;
49. Any direction given by a Peace Officer pursuant to this Bylaw may be given:
- (a) verbally; and/or
 - (b) in writing served in person or ordinary mail.

PART IX – PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT

50. Any person violating a provision of this Bylaw is liable to the specified penalty set out in Schedule “A” herein.
51. It is the intention of the Town Council that each separate provision of this Bylaw shall be deemed independent of all other provisions, and it is further the intention of the Town Council that if any provisions of this Bylaw be declared invalid, all other provisions shall remain valid and enforceable.
52. A Peace Officer is hereby authorized to issue a Municipal Violation Tag or a Violation Ticket with a specified penalty pursuant to the Provincial Offences Procedure Act, S.A. 1988, c. P-21.5, as amended, and regulations thereunder, for any contravention made under this Bylaw.
53. Nothing in this Bylaw shall prevent a Peace Officer from immediately laying an information or issuing a Violation Ticket for the mandatory Court appearance of any person who contravenes any provision of this Bylaw.
54. Service of any notice, violation ticket, violation tag, or other legal documents by a Peace Officer shall be sufficient if it is:
- (a) personally served upon the person charged; or
 - (b) served by ordinary mail; or
 - (c) left for the person charged at his/her place of abode with a resident thereof who appears to be at least 18 years of age or over.

PART X – EFFECTIVE DATE AND REPEAL

55. Upon third and final reading of this bylaw, Bylaw #580/97 is hereby repealed.
56. This Bylaw shall come into force upon the third and final reading thereof.
